

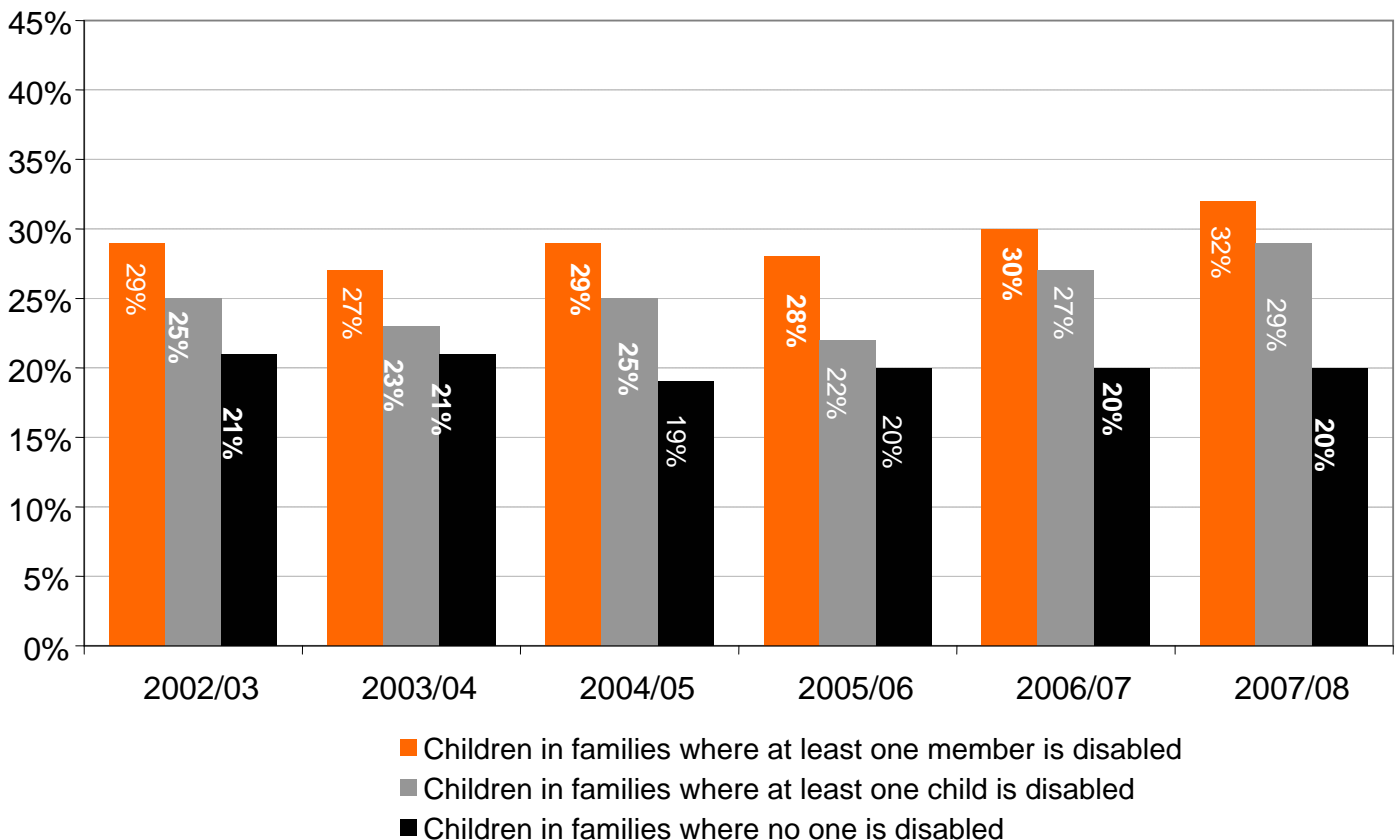
C1 – Children living in income poverty

Baseline and Trends: Baseline year – 2004/05. Before housing costs, no statistically significant change has been registered through this indicator. After housing costs, the only significant changes registered between 2004/05 and 2007/08 have affected the percentage of children living in income poverty in families where no one is disabled, which increased from 26% to 28%, and the percentage of children living in income poverty in families with disabled children regardless of adult disability, which increased from 32% to 38%.

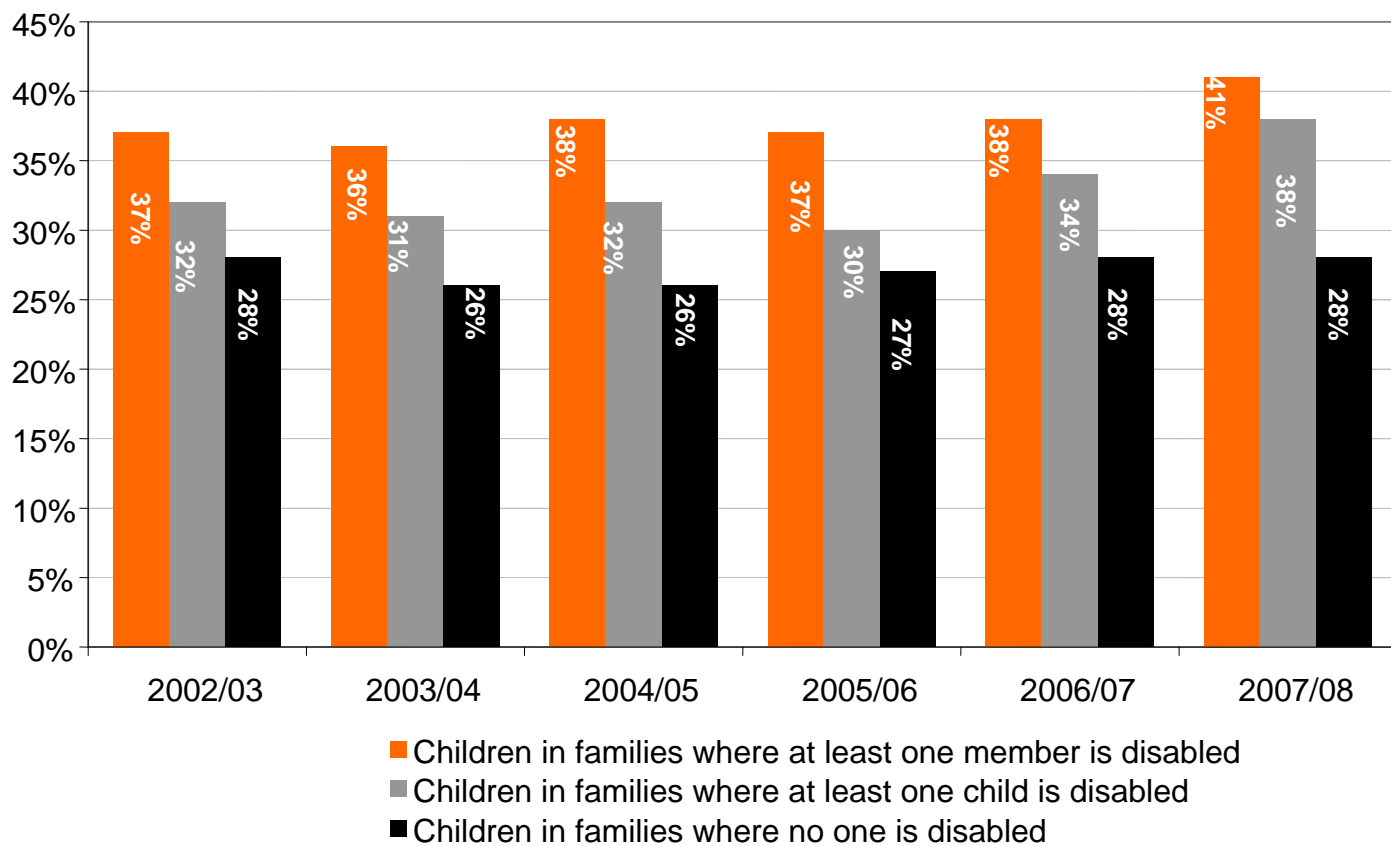
Both before and after taking into consideration housing costs

- the risk of low income for children is significantly higher in families where at least one member is disabled than families where no-one is disabled
- the risk of low income for children is significantly higher in families where at least one child is disabled than families where no-one is disabled
- there is no significant difference in the risk of low income for children in families where at least one child is disabled and families where at least one individual is disabled

Definition: People with disabilities are defined as respondents who report a limiting long standing illness, impairment or disability. Everyone in this group would meet the definition of disability in the Disability Discrimination Act (DDA); however, these estimates do not reflect the total number of people covered by the DDA as the FRS does not collect this information. Data is for United Kingdom.
